UNDP Mandate



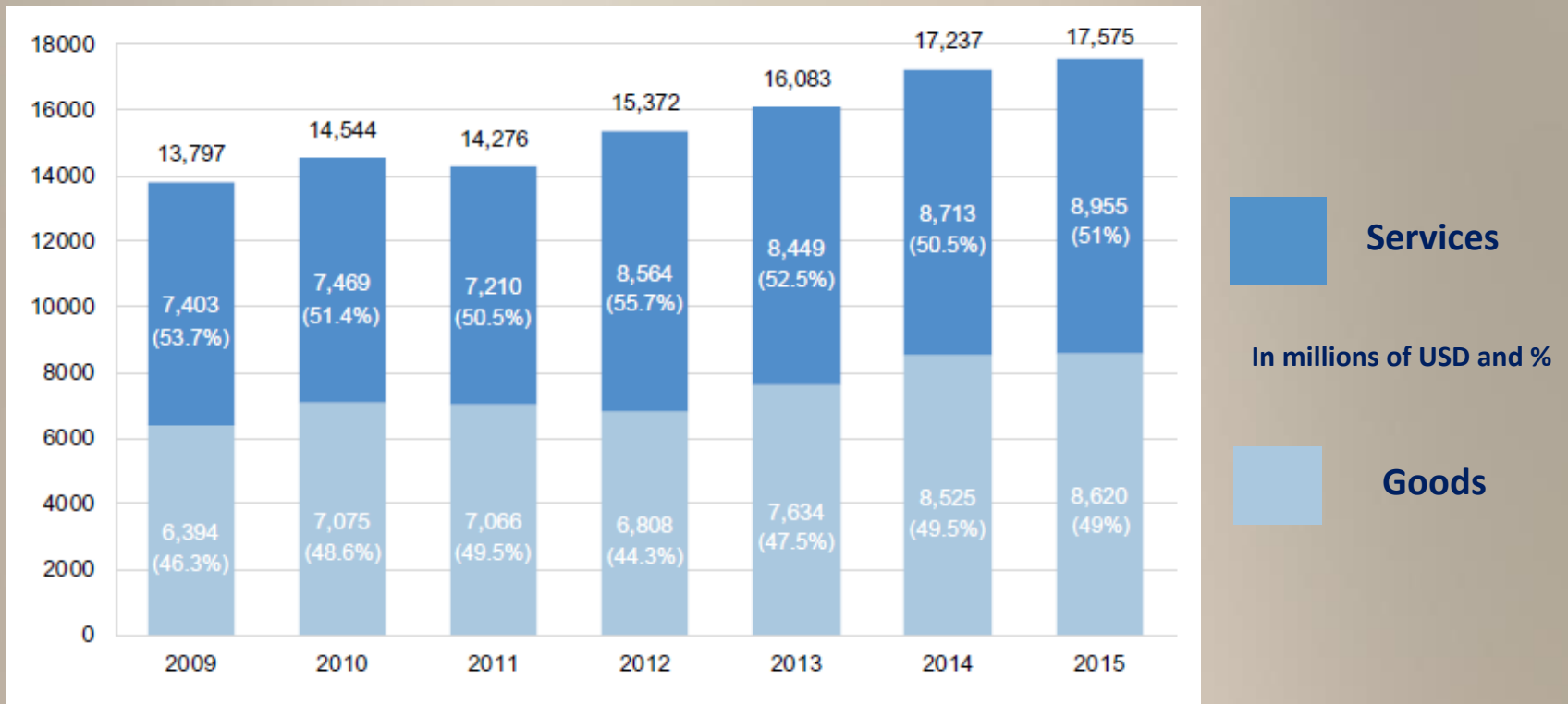
- **Focuses on specific Developmental issues, including SDGs**
- **Works with National Governments and Institutions**
- **Global operating in 177 countries.**
- **Coordinates all United Nations (UN) development activities at the country level as the manager of the Resident Coordinator system.**
- **Decentralized procurement approach – Offices are responsible for the acquisition of goods, civil works and services.**

Goods and Services

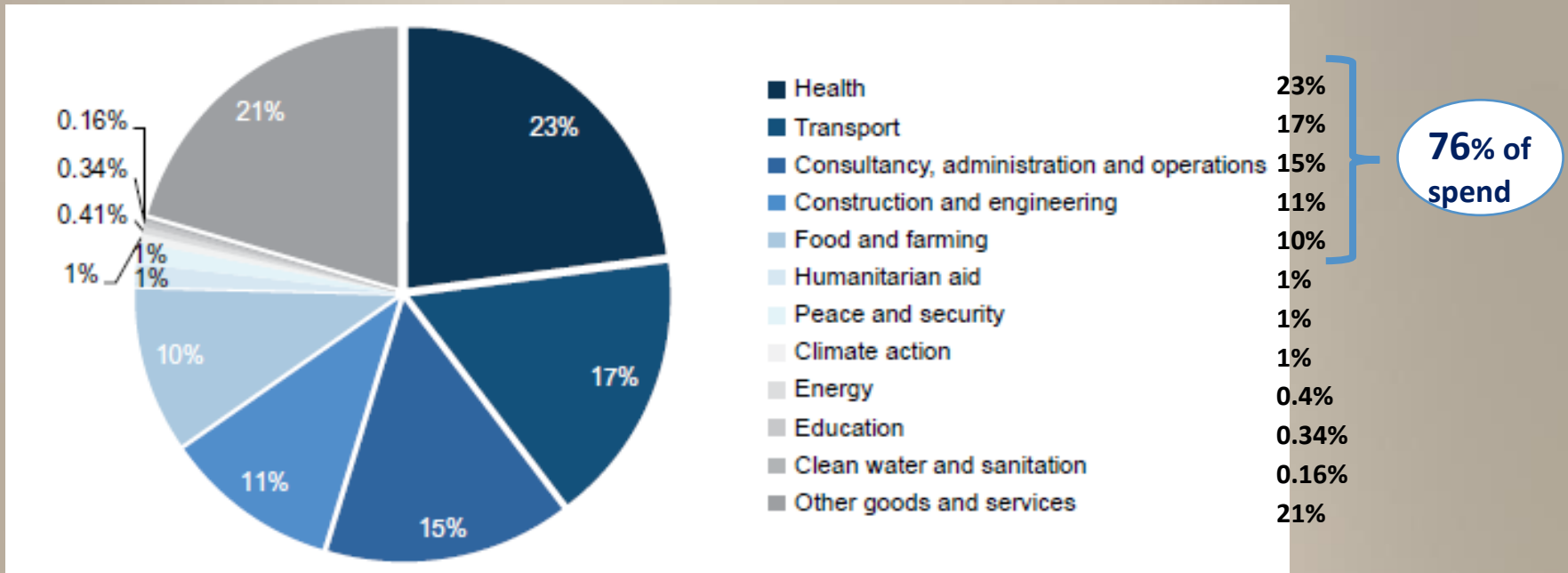
- Total procurement volume increased to **\$17.6 billion** in **2015**; an increase of **2.0%**.

Preparedness & Response

- Use of existing UN pre-positioning good and services mechanisms.
- Internal and external Experts rosters.
- Extensive use of existing Long Term Purchasing Agreements.
- Fast Track procedural activation.



Preparedness & Response

- Simplified contracting modality for engaging CSO/NGOs as responsible implementing (non commercial) parties.
- Stand-by agreement with external partners to facilitate access to prepositioned equipment and supplies.



Crisis Prevention & Recovery

Equipment / Goods needs;

- Emergency Relief Items (blankets, cooking sets)
- Tents, Debris removal, body bags
- ICT equipment
- Security items
- Emergency power generation (renewable energies)
- Pre-fab housing /shelters
- Office in a box





Crisis Prevention & Recovery

Service requirements;

- Technical experts (operational support and advisors)
- Communication services
- Rental of heavy machinery
- Logistic services (warehousing, last mile, etc.)
- Reintegration & Training services
- Engagement of international & national NGOs
- Early warning systems

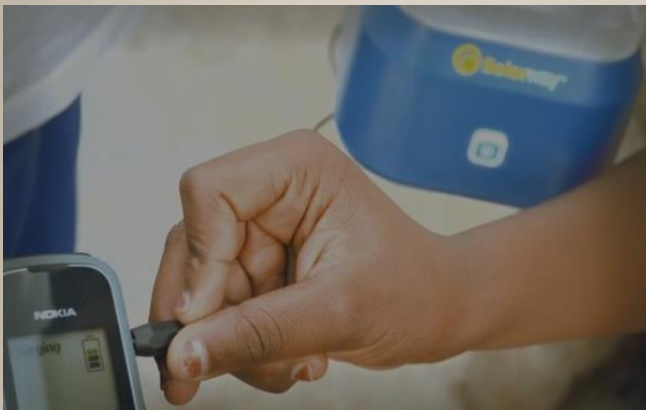




Solar Technology and Products



- Solar appliances have been purchased and prepositioned for immediate deployment in crisis situations
- In Ebola-affected countries, COs were able to switch over to solar power, ensuring the grid would serve hospitals first
- Solar lanterns are also critical in responding to natural disasters / power infrastructure damage

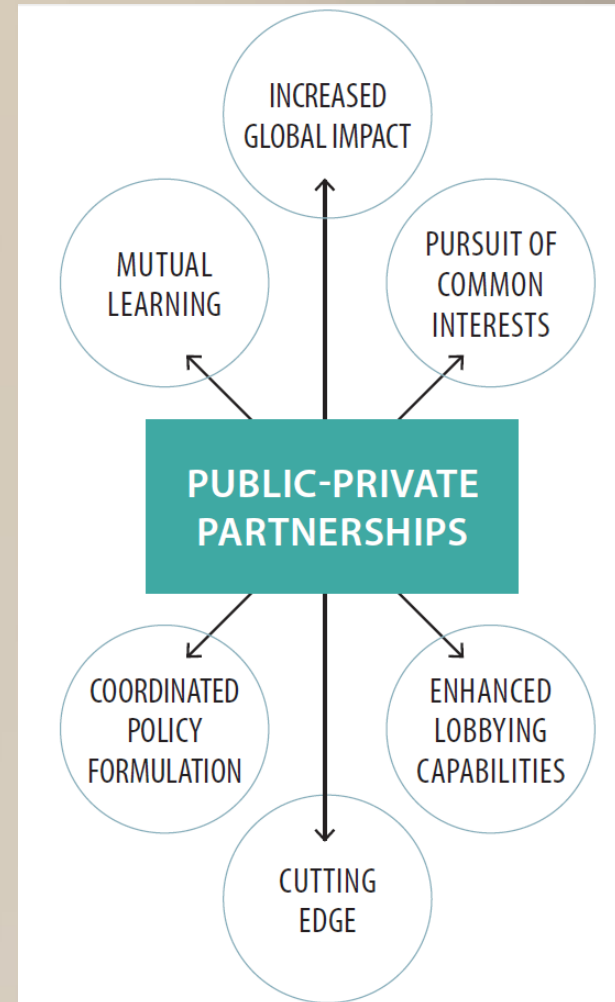

Stronger Partnerships

- Public-private partnerships – interconnectedness, corporate social responsibility, innovation
- Government partnerships – capacity building (e.g. NIM support).
- Integration with the UN system – Delivering as One, Greening the Blue, other system-wide initiatives





Stronger Partnerships



- **Integration of Supply Management:** The traditional “Arms-length Relationship” is being transformed into “Partnership” with suppliers.
- Collaborative efforts, strategic alliances and long term purchasing agreements or framework.
- Innovations procurement and solutions - piloted in UNDP. Allows better opportunities presented by collaborative technologies and to engage people, organizations, and communities where problems are clearly defined but solutions are not.



(Example) Public-Private Partnerships



- Joint UN initiative for green procurement in the health sector
- Attracted the Global Fund, UNITAID and GAVI as partners, in addition to UNFPA, UNOPS, WHO, UNEP, UNICEF and UNHCR
- Similar sector-specific initiatives (e.g. renewable energies) could be developed
- E.g. in discussions with Tesla re: battery storage (LTA) in Zambia and Senegal with others likely to join.





Sustainable Initiatives



TESLA Partnership

- Powerwall and Powerblock can address energy scarcity in Senegal
- Batteries – as well as solar panels and inverters – can be installed in villages and connected to solar systems
- Improves access to electricity and allows hospitals, businesses, etc. to operate at night
